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## Notes From Dorene

What a great State Conference South Central Area had in Salina! The many educational workshops, entertaining speeches and other presentations, and the good food added up to three great days together! Thank you South Central Area for an enjoyable and well planned Conference.

As the 2017 Holiday Season approaches, I look forward to some respite as well as acquiring some new ideas. In order to generate new ideas, however, it is necessary to first scrutinize what has been accomplished this year.

Our 2017 membership year has been a good one. Our net loss in membership was 57—the lowest in several years—with 8 of those losses the result of member deaths. Congratulations to all Kansas FCE members for working on reaching out to others and bringing new members in. Let's keep that focus in 2018! Keep seeking members into at least March of 2018; collecting of dues and getting members in September and October is just the beginning of working on membership.

Marketing has gone very well in 2017. We sold all of three of the four new marketing items for 2016. We introduced two new marketing items for 2017—a screen printed business bag and an embroidered fleece stadium blanket—with “FCE: Making A Difference.” We've already had to reorder the business bag. Polo shirts & sweat shirts are still available by order. If you desire to order, contact me or your Area Director. Thanks to all who have supported KAFCE marketing endeavors!

For the first time, the 2017 August Mailing was sent in an e-mail with attachment. Of course, such a first time endeavor isn't without its hitches! Judy Fullmer & I forgot about the individual unit membership lists to be included separately for the County Council Presidents to distribute to each unit. A special “sorting” of data has to be planned ahead of time. That will be “fixed” next August! While I talked to many County Council Presidents personally, there are some who got missed, or couldn't download the document, or missed the mailing, or didn't recognize it. Many of those contacted me and we worked out another contact person or corrected an e-mail address or got a new one. I have no doubt there are still some who need some help with this, but it is a small number. The August Mailing was sent to all KAFCE Board Members, County Council Presidents, Independent Members without a County Council, KAFCE Past Presidents, all Kansas County Extension FCS Agents (or AG Agents if there wasn't a FCS Agent) who have an FCE Unit or Units in their counties or Districts. An FYI booklet was not published at State Conference this year for three reasons: expense, repetition of material that had already been published in the “KAFCE News,” and the percentage of Kansas members receiving a copy of the FYI—10% as opposed to 100% receiving the “KAFCE News.” Material that was in the FYI only will be published in the “KAFCE News.” To provide space in the “News,” the Area Director Reports have been eliminated. FCE Members will be able to keep up with Area happenings with an Area Calendar printed in the right hand box on the bottom of the back page of each Issue of the “News.”

I have had to remember more than once this year that “Life is all about how you handle Plan B.” Right before sending the last bits of the “KAFCE News” July Issue for printing & mailing, a computer crashed. The page was lost listing the 2016 100% reporting awards and the 2016 Individual and Unit Recognition Awards. Somehow, the 2015 rewards page was republished. The 2017 Conference insert was lost as well. The immediate Plan B was to mail the Conference Insert in a separate mailing. The Plan B for the Awards page is to publish it in this November Issue—Please see the awards page inside.

I am going to emphasize CONNECTIONS in the year 2018. It is so important to our functioning as human beings to be connected to one another in a meaningful way. **Amendment Submitted to NAFCE Bylaws Committee**

The voting delegates at the 2017 Kansas FCE Conference voted to submit an amendment to the National FCE Bylaws Committee to establish the Legacy Fund in the National Bylaws. The purpose of the Legacy Fund is to stabilize National FCE fiscally so that the organization will be saved for future generations.

At the 2014 National FCE Conference, a proposal was adopted to set up a long term fund that all members could donate to as they wish. The Fund presently is in an Edward Jones investment account and donations have been accepted for the past three years. It was reported at the 2017 National Conference that there is \$31,183.13 in the account.

Money has been collected from State Associations and individuals with the intention of establishing an endowment to help support National FCE in the future. The funds collected so far haven't been sufficient to use any of the interest from the account for the benefit of FCE.

The Kansas FCE amendment would create a new bylaws article that would establish the Fund and give some direction as to its use and how members would be appointed to the Legacy Committee. Current members of the Committee are Bob Hannon, AZ; Phyllis Narus, TN; Oarlene Wingate, HI; and the National FCE Executive Committee.

The proposed amendment has been sent to the National FCE Bylaws Committee Chairman, Ardyce Snyder.

**Kansas Well Represented on NAFCE Board**

These ladies were elected in Omaha in July at the National FCE Conference. They join Sharon Giacometti, NAFCE Program Coordinator. KAFCE is proud of Kansas participation on the National level!

**Liability Insurance**

For several years, NAFCE has provided a liability insurance administered by Klamath Insurance Center. (This is the Klamath Insurance form received in the August mailing with an explanation of how to complete the form). The premium is paid for by a portion of each Kansas FCE members' annual dues. The insurance covers liability for the National Board and for all NAFCE members when an FCE event occurs where non-FCE members are involved. It protects FCE in the event that they would be sued by a non FCE member.

However, this insurance has become so costly, that NAFCE is having difficulty paying the annual premium—\$20,000—for the States' part of the insurance. National has made no definite decision yet, but the options are limited: collect more donations or dues to cover the premium or drop the insurance. Kansas FCE members must seriously consider our options if NAFCE is forced to drop the insurance. Do we want/need the insurance? If so, how do we pay for it? Please give this some consideration and thought at the local and area level. I (and you can too) will be doing some investigation on other options to share with you. Stay tuned—you will be hearing from the Board.

### A William Allen White Lesson

William Allen White was a famous Kansas journalist. After he died in 1944, two memorial foundations were created in his name. In 1952, Emporia State University created one of these foundations—The William Allen White Children's Book Awards—to honor the memory of this Emporia newspaperman.

Ruth Garver Gagliardo was an employee of White's at the Emporia Gazette, and it was she who laid the groundwork for the Children's Book Award Program. Gagliardo wrote a column about books, music and art for children. She was one of the first to review children's books for a newspaper, which gave parents, teachers, and librarians the chance to know about good quality books for children. Her column then led to "The Children's Bookshelf," a book review column in the "Kansas Teacher" magazine. She also started the children's Traveling Book Exhibit to introduce good books to children all over the state for 23 years..

The motto of the Awards Program is "Bringing Authors, Books, and Children Together." It is a way to stimulate the reading of excellent literature among Kansas kids. Each year the book selection committee (to which the KAFCE President appoints a representative) reads books written for kids in grades three through eight. The committee members then submit nominations, following the program guidelines, three times a year to the selection committee chairperson, presently Beverley Buller.

The selection committee members then meet in September to choose the master reading lists from the nominations—one for grades three through five, and another for grades six through eight. In order to participate in the meeting the committee members must have read at least 50% of the nominated books—in 2017, about 60 books. After the nomination list is narrowed down to about 20 books total between the two lists, the authors and the publishers of the selected books are contacted and sign a contract that their book will be kept in print the entire time it is on the master list and, if their book should be voted the winner of the WAW Book Award, they will attend the Awards ceremony the following October.

The lists are then given out to all public and school libraries. In April, the children who have read at least two of the books on the WAW master list, vote for their favorite, resulting in a winning book in each of the two age categories. At the awards ceremony in October, the winning authors have a morning autographing session followed by games and the awards presentation. Two Kansas children are selected to present the awards to the winning authors. In the past, the public library systems took turns selecting the kids. Now, the Kansas Association of School Librarians' six districts selects the children presenters, with the privilege of selection rotating among the six districts.

The award celebration used to move around the state, sponsored by various organizations. In the 50th anniversary year of the WAW Children's Book Awards, the celebration was moved to Emporia and has remained there.

This is the 65th year of bringing authors, books, and children together in the State of Kansas through the WAW Book Awards. This is the only Book Award, that chooses the winning books by children's votes.

### **2017 William Allen White Report**

The William Allen White Committee met on September 9th, 2017, in Emporia, KS, to select the books that Kansas children will read during the 2018-2019 school year. I successfully read 74 of the 130 titles nominated and was glad to see that several of my favorites made the list for the kids to read next year.

The winning books for 2017 were Life on Mars, by Jennifer Brown, selected by voters in Grades three through five. A Million Ways Home, by Dianna Dorisi Winget was the winner selected by voters in Grades six through eight.

This was my last year on the committee, I learned so much during my time on the committee and have enjoyed being the KAFCE representative.

Nadine Holmes, N W Area, Smith Center, KS, was appointed to replace Leanna on the WAW Selection Committee as the KAFCE Representative. Nadine was invited by the WAW selection committee chair to observe the September, 2017, selection meeting in Emporia. Nadine's work will begin in January, 2018. Nadine commented, "I can't wait for 2018 and the new list of books we will read!"

### Kansas FCE Membership Report

Kansas FCE recorded 995 members for 2017, including 700 individual members, 257 senior members and 38 members in family memberships. There were also 3 youth memberships that don't pay Kansas FCE dues, just National dues. The loss of members from 2016 was 57, this loss continues to decline. There were 21 new members to FCE and 3 members rejoined. There were 8 deaths for the year.
